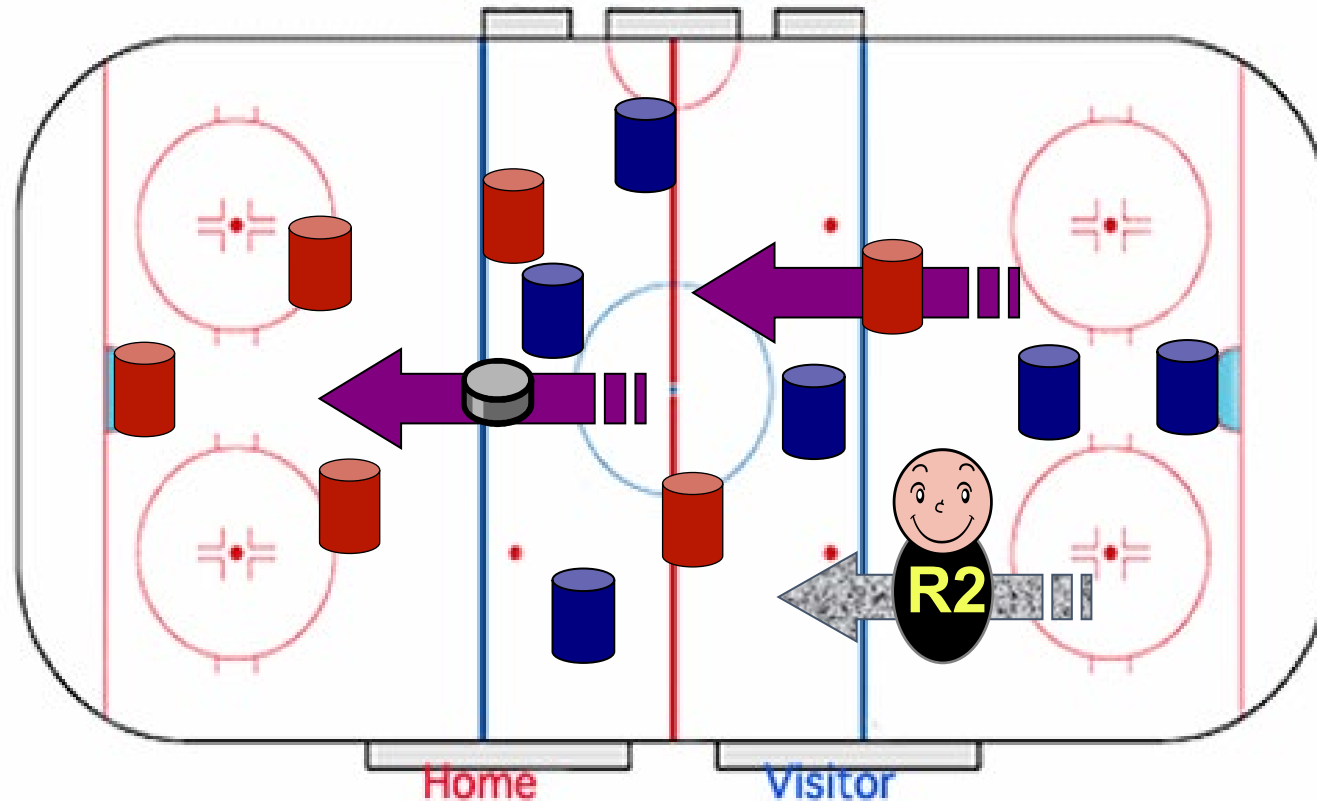
RULES OF THUMB

As Lead Referee, never let the play pass you.



RULES OF THUMB

Trailing Referee never passes trailing defender.



STANDARD OFFICIATING PROCEDURE



Normally, the Referee in the neutral zone at a stoppage:

- Keeps the neutral zone, and
- Controls line change.



STANDARD OFFICIATING PROCEDURE



Normally, the Referee in the neutral zone at a stoppage:

- Keeps the neutral zone, and
 - Controls line change.

One Exception:

- Referee in neutral zone reports a penalty



STANDARD OFFICIATING PROCEDURE



Referee that reports a penalty sets up closest to the goal;

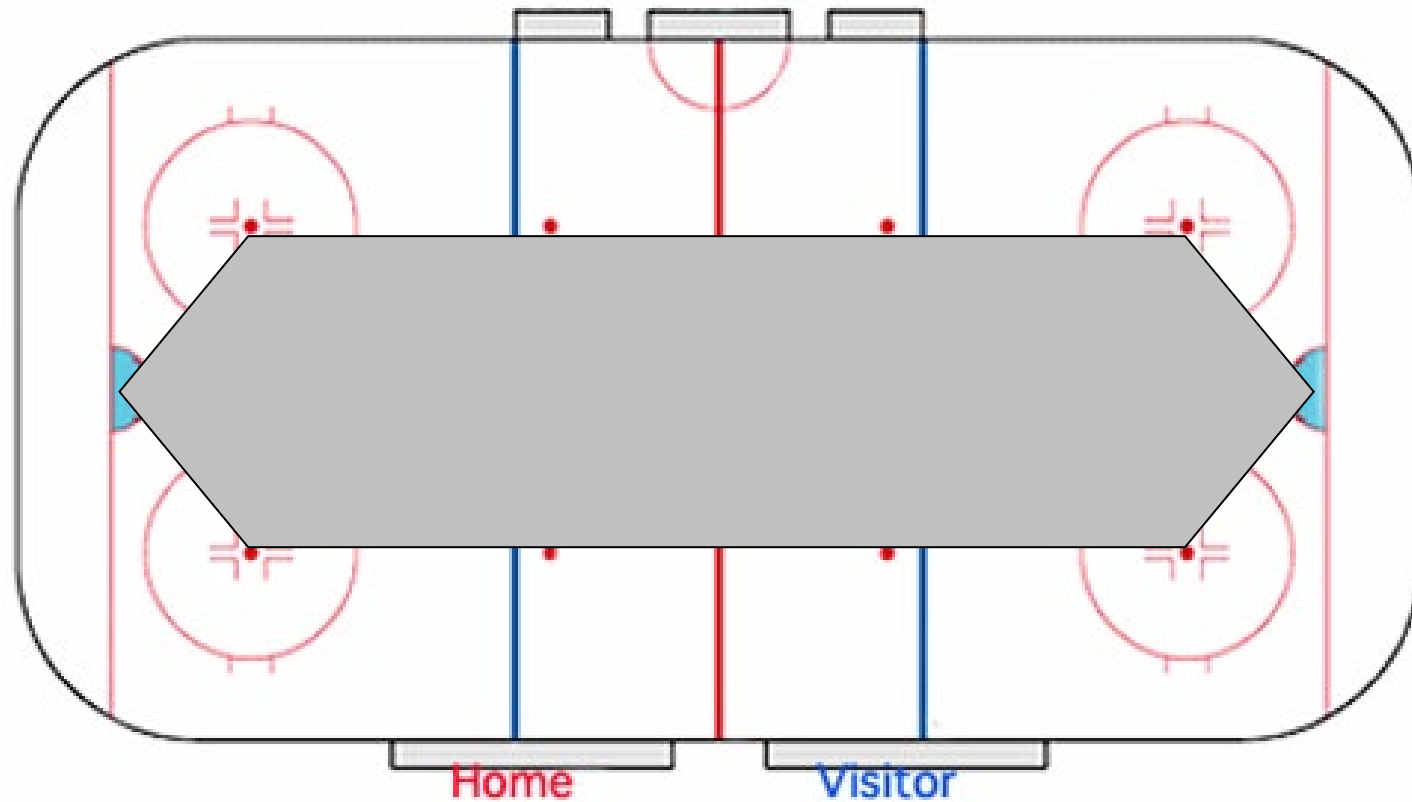
Partner does the line change procedure.



DIRECTIVES



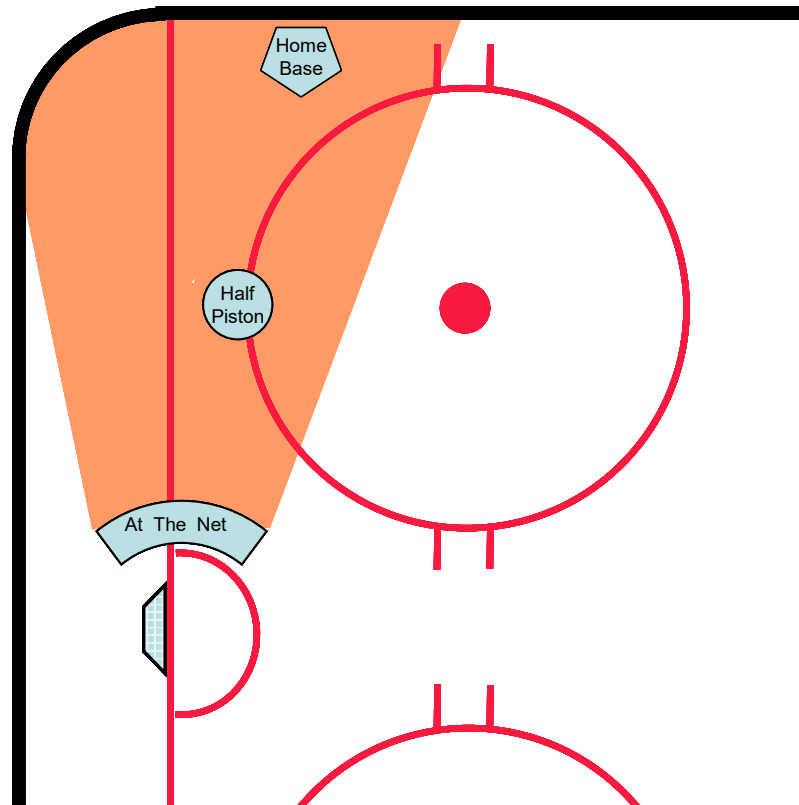
Stay out of “The Danger Zone”



DIRECTIVES



Use the End Zone Cone to be in position in the end zone



PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS



Start of Period Face-Offs

- “Suggested” that...
 - Senior Referee does start of game face-off
 - Junior Referee does other start of period face-offs



PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS



Start of Period Face-Offs

- Drop puck facing timekeeper
- “Free” Referee is on penalty box side
- “Free” Referee goes with the play



PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS



For face-offs other than those that occur at centre ice...

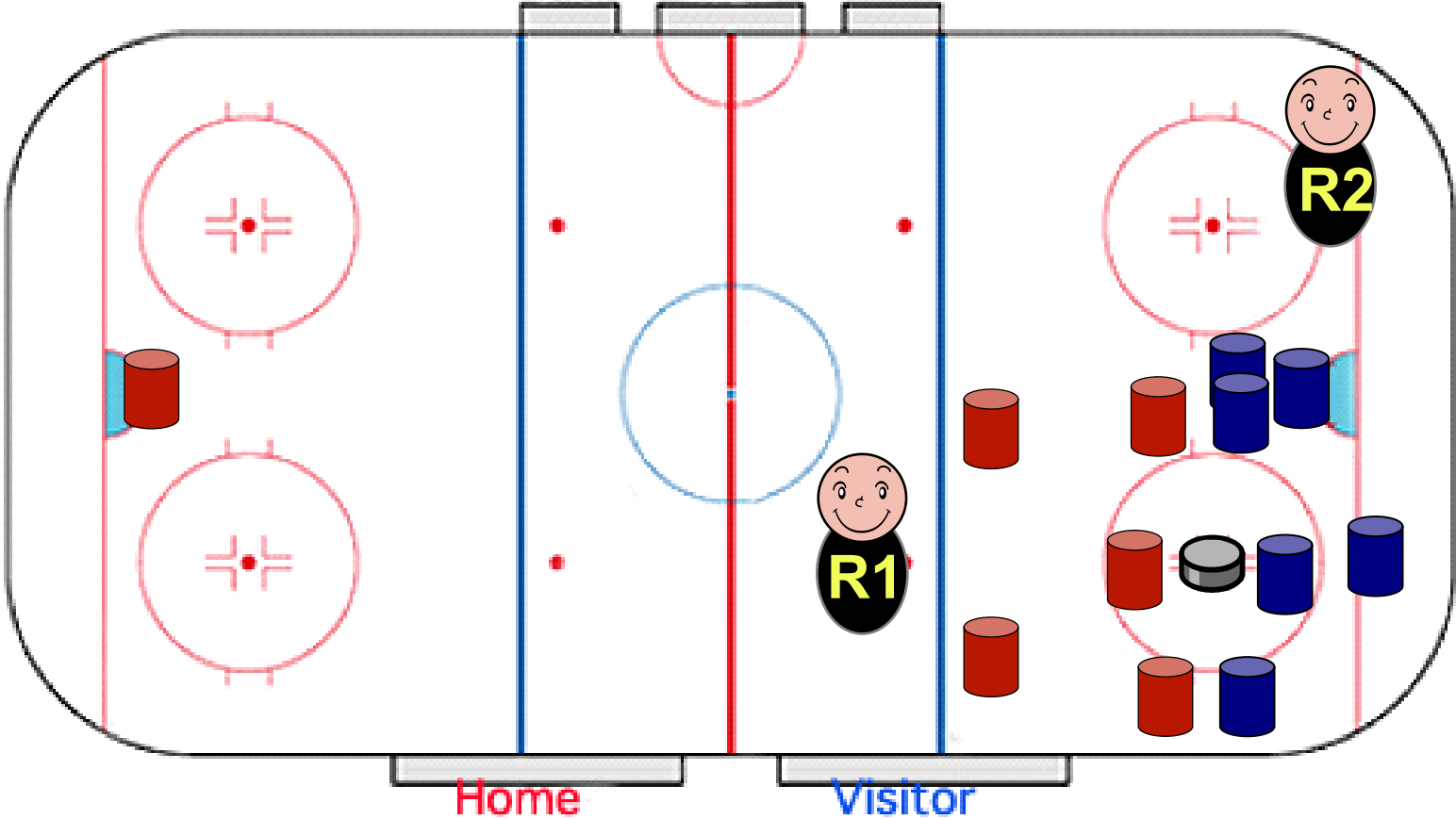
- “Front/Lead” referee sets up as per 3 official system
- “Back” referee always sets up on same side of rink as the face-off location

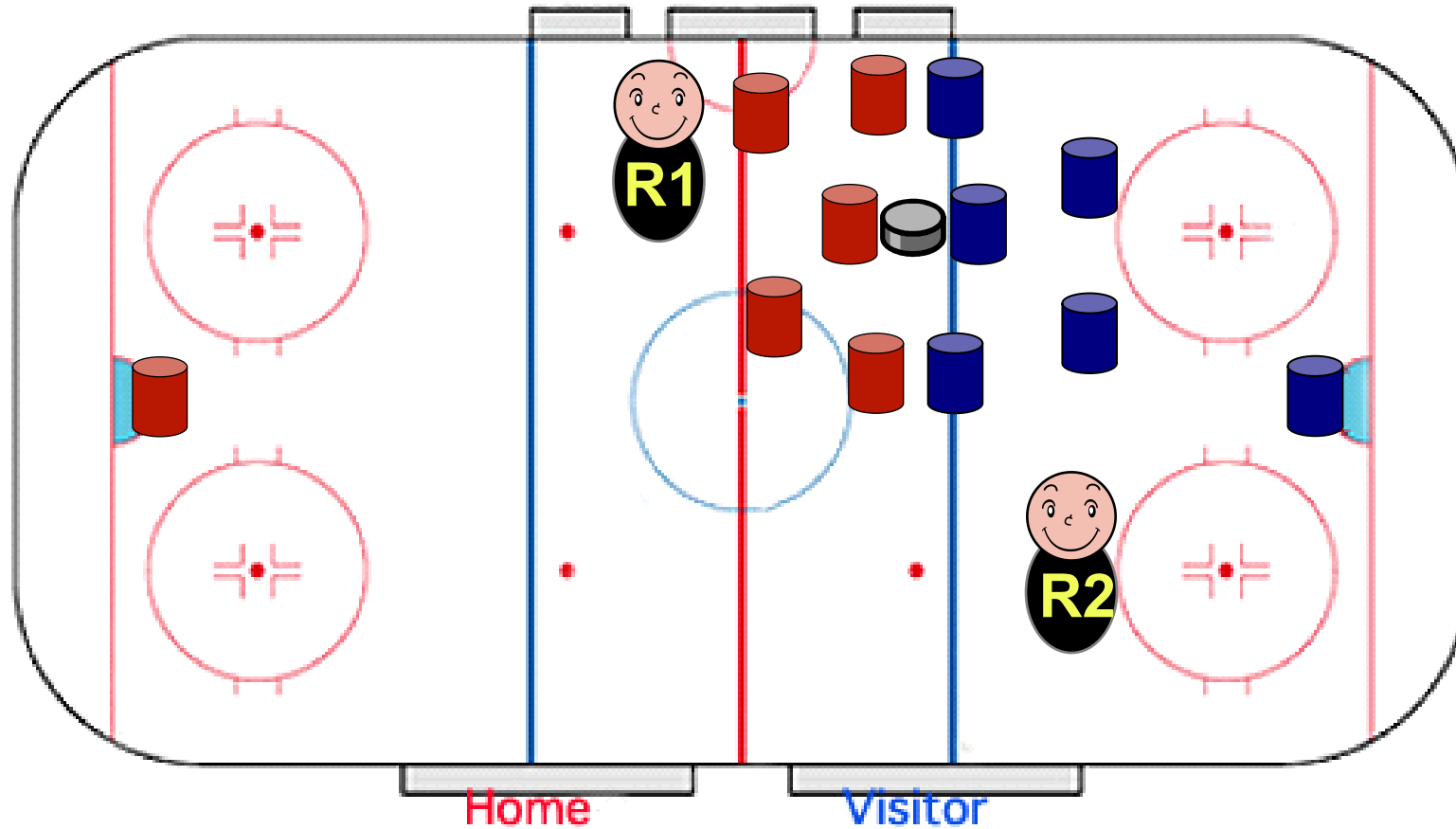

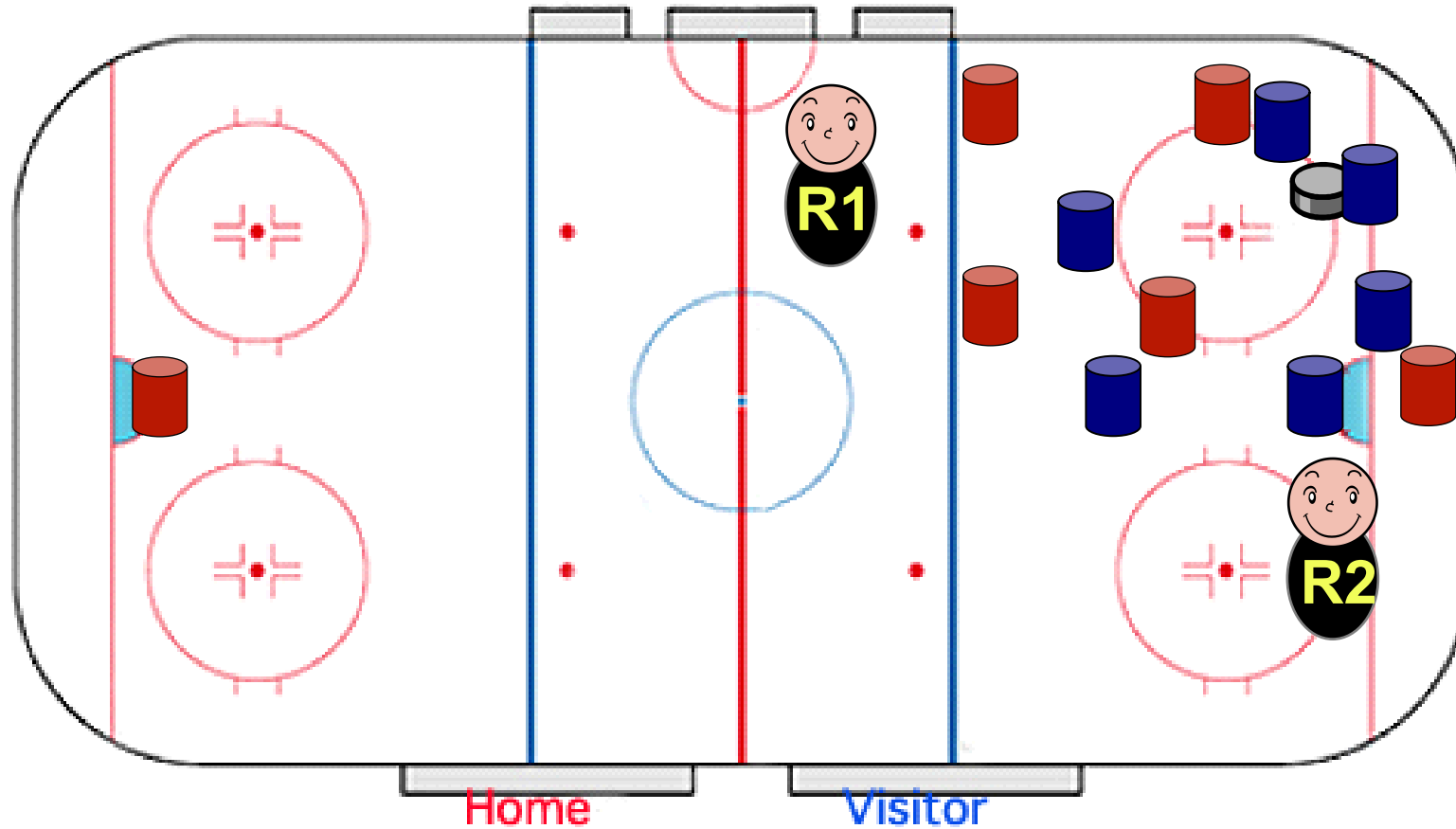

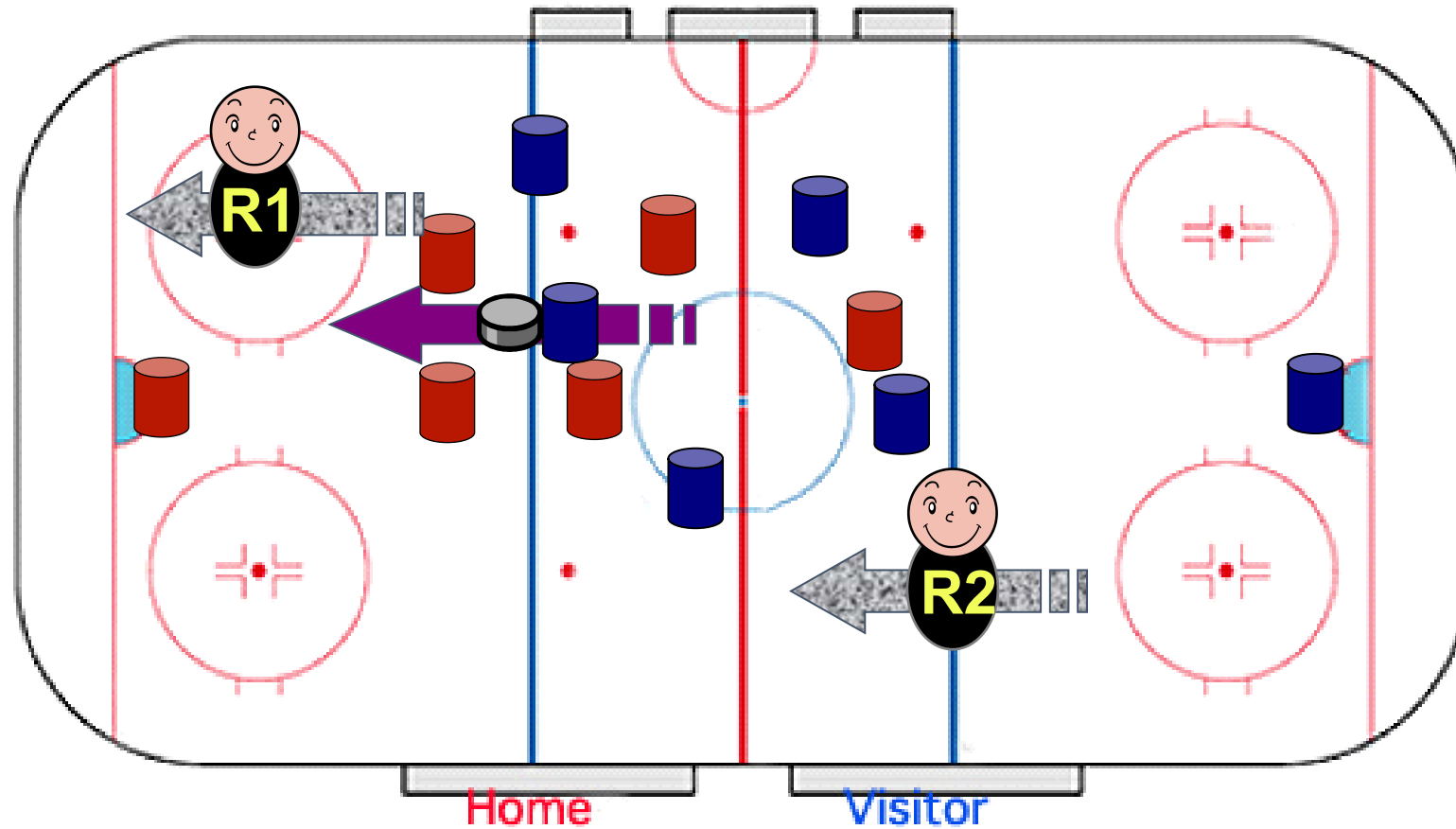

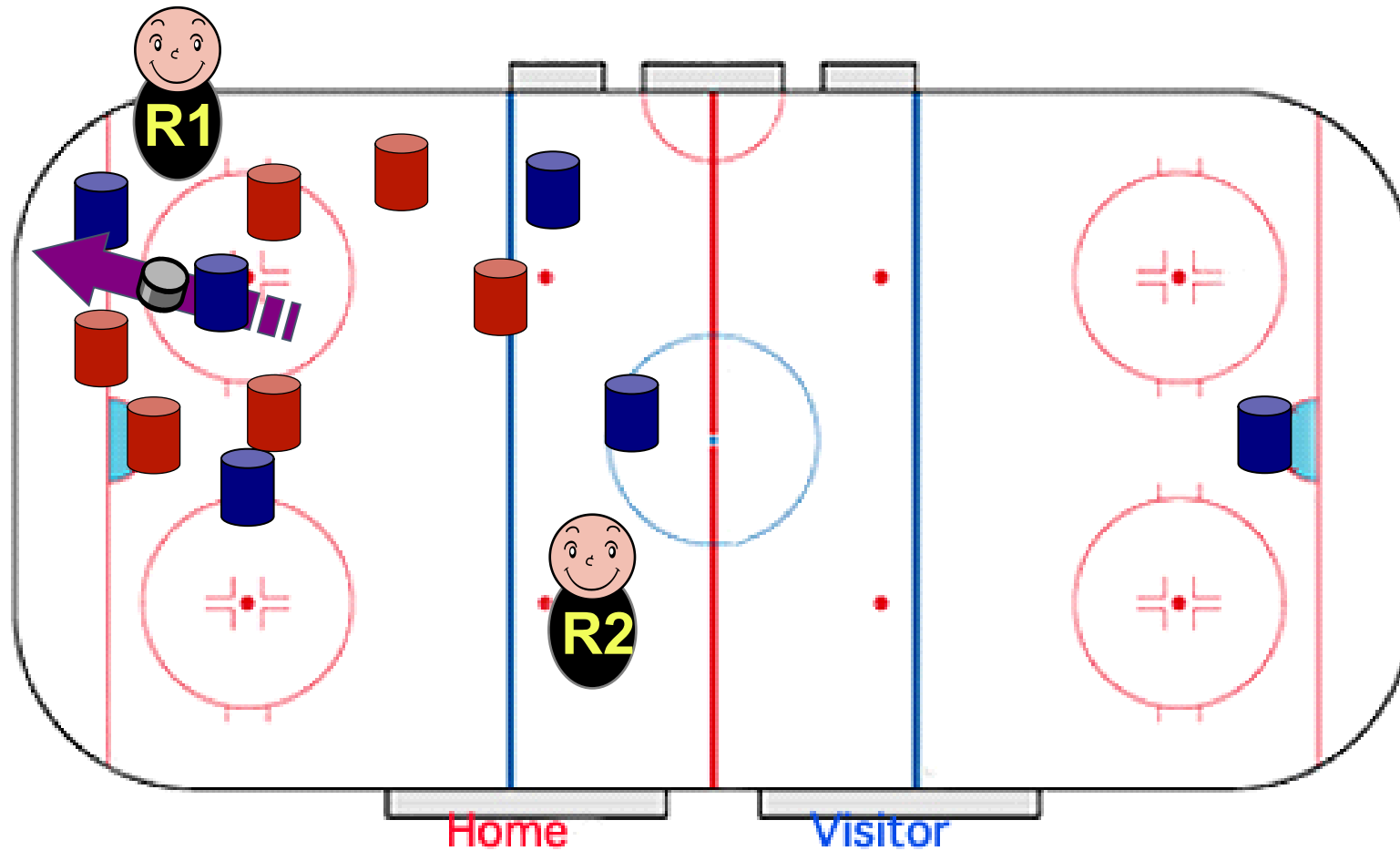

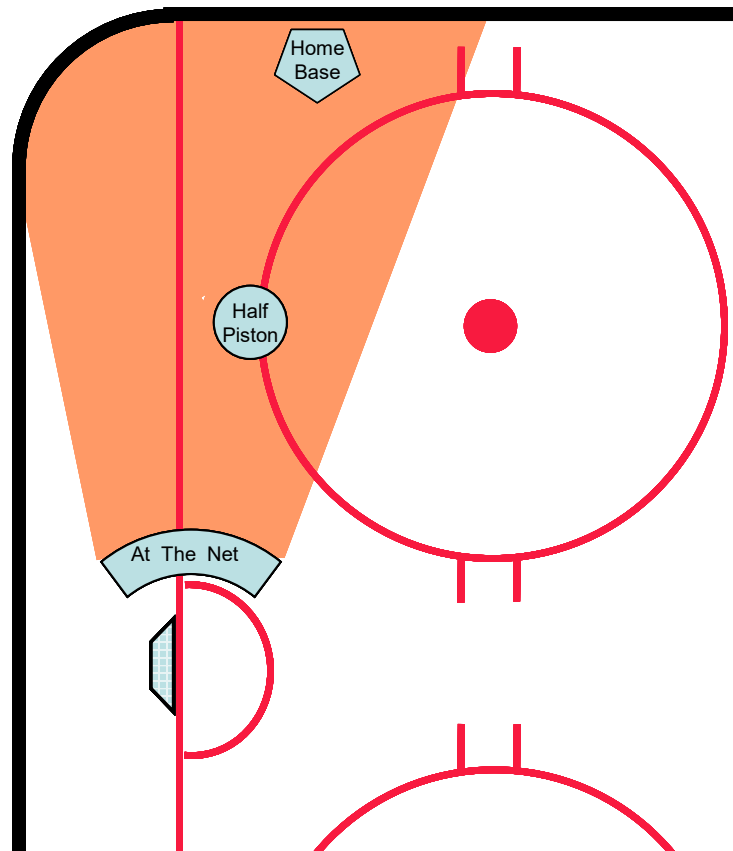

- Use the End Zone Cone

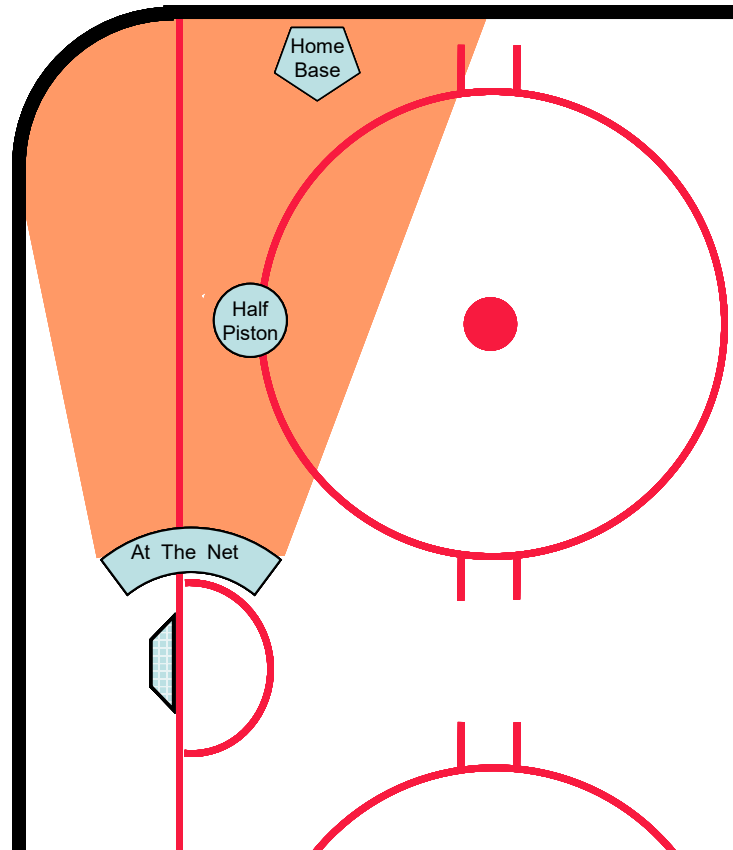

- Reverse Pivot is OK.

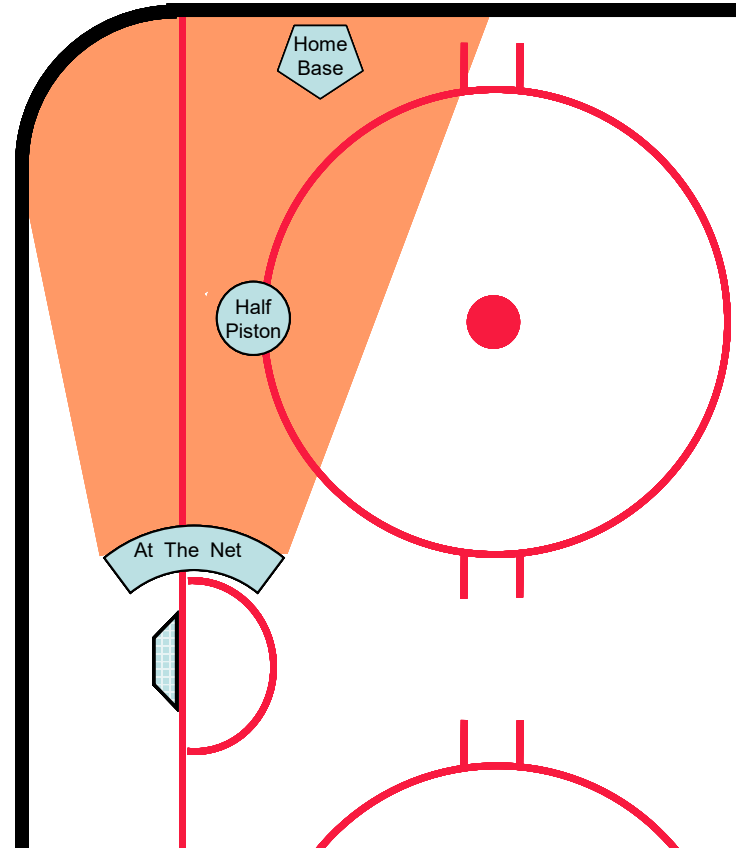


PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS

- It is permissible to cross behind the net occasionally when it is absolutely necessary.

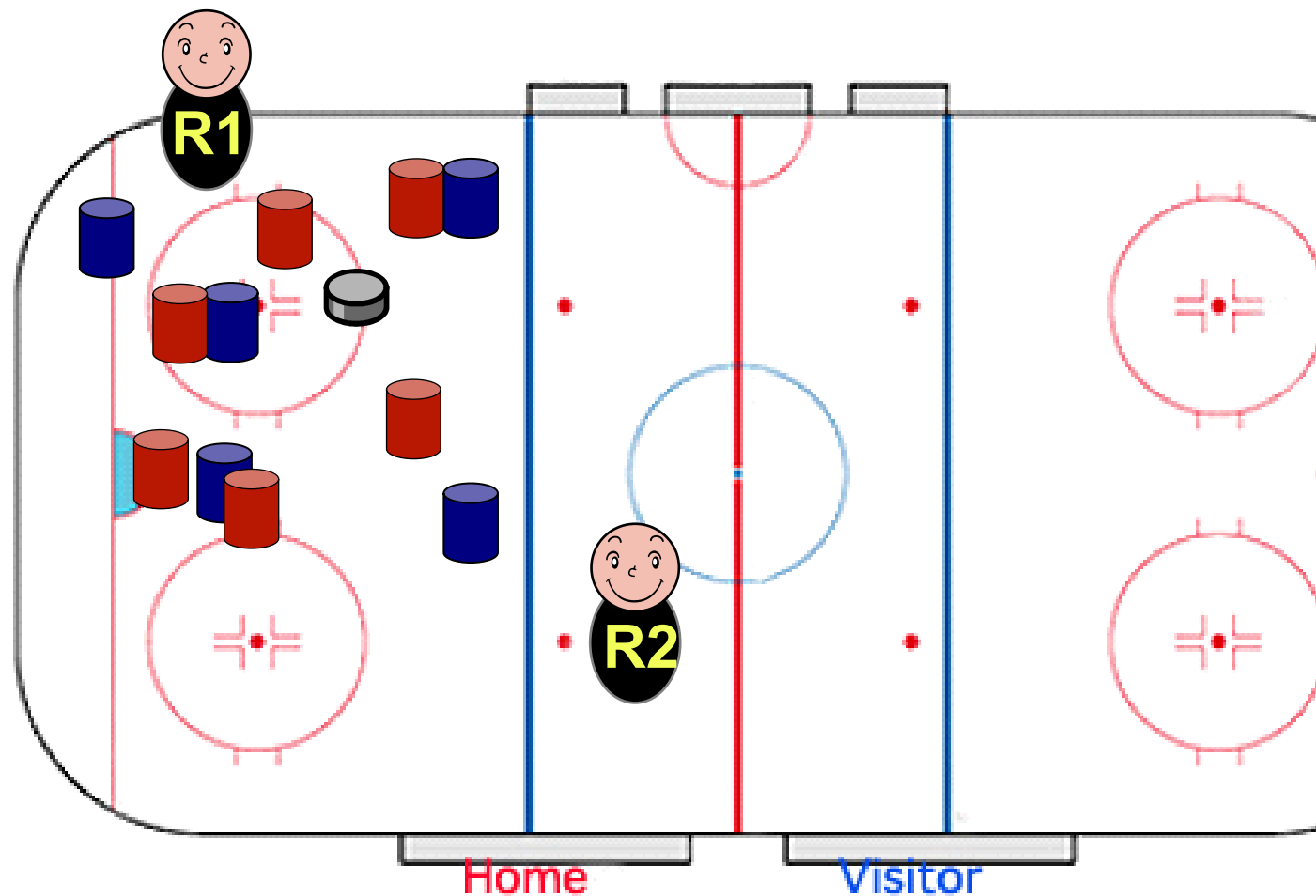

End Zone Lookout Responsibilities

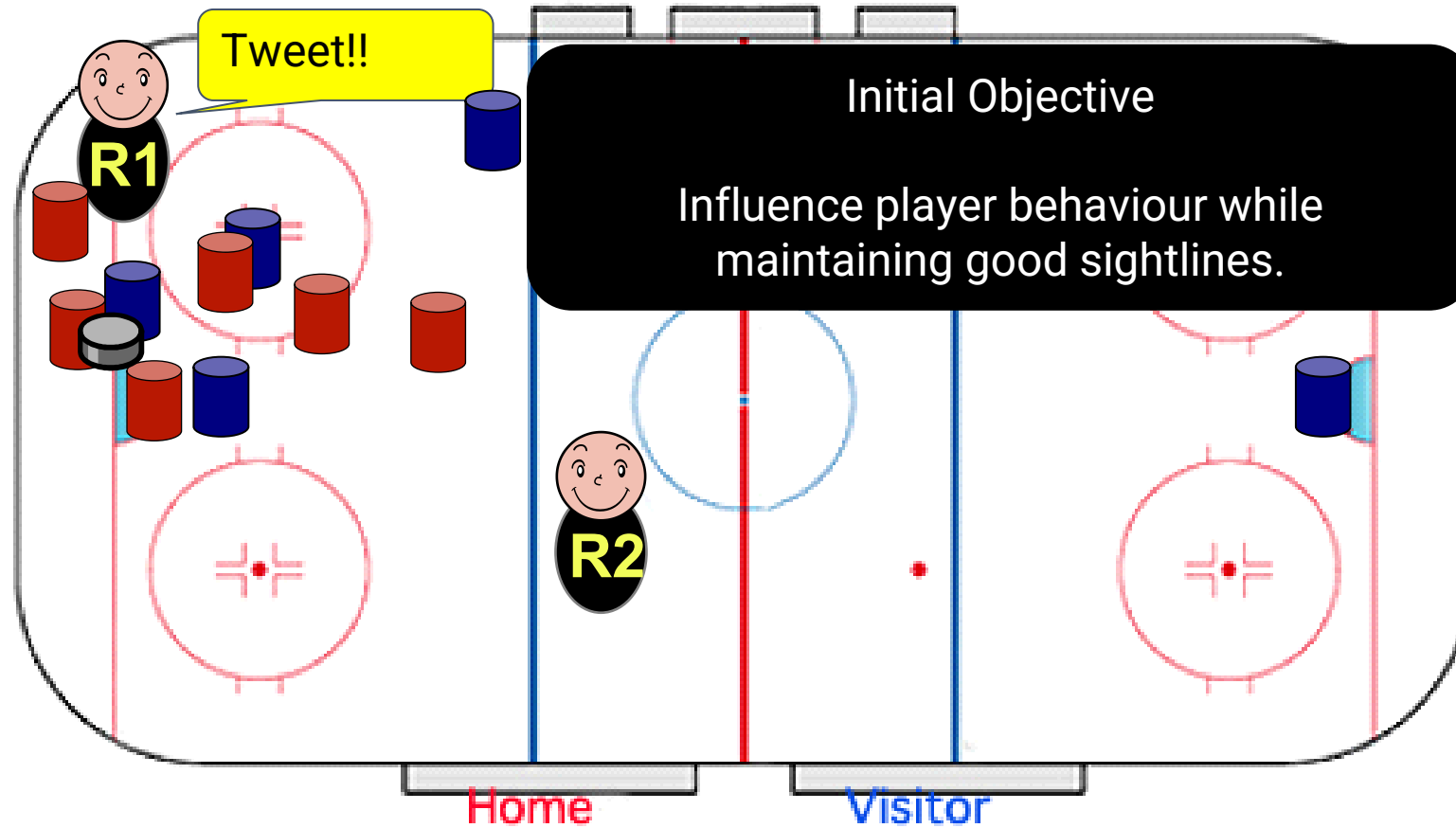
- Front Referee:
 - Scoring opportunities
 - Play at-the-puck
- Back Referee:
 - Play away from the puck
 - “Hot spots”, “Floaters”, Benches

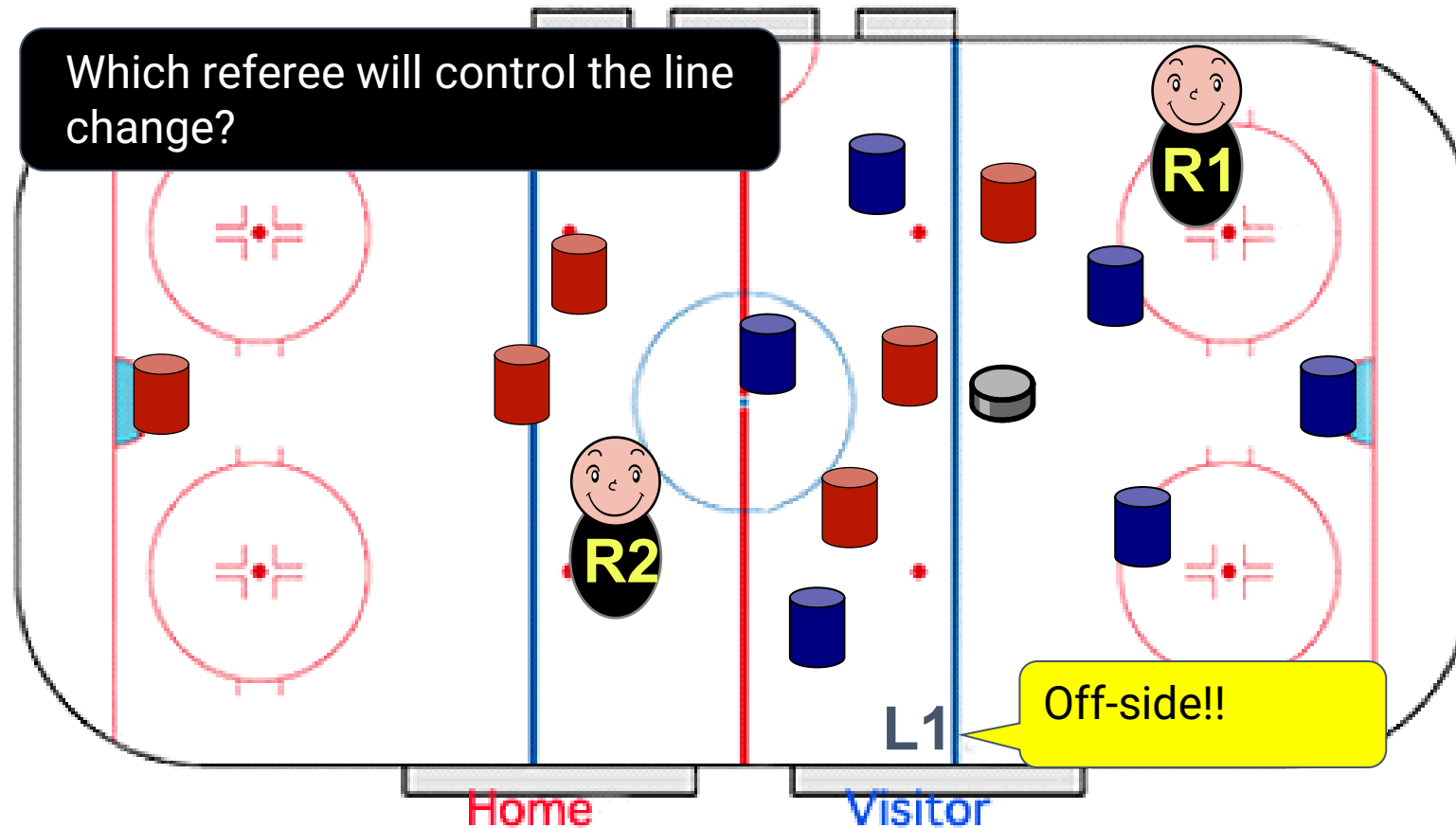


Scenario #2 – Immediate Off-Side – Neutral Zone Face-Off

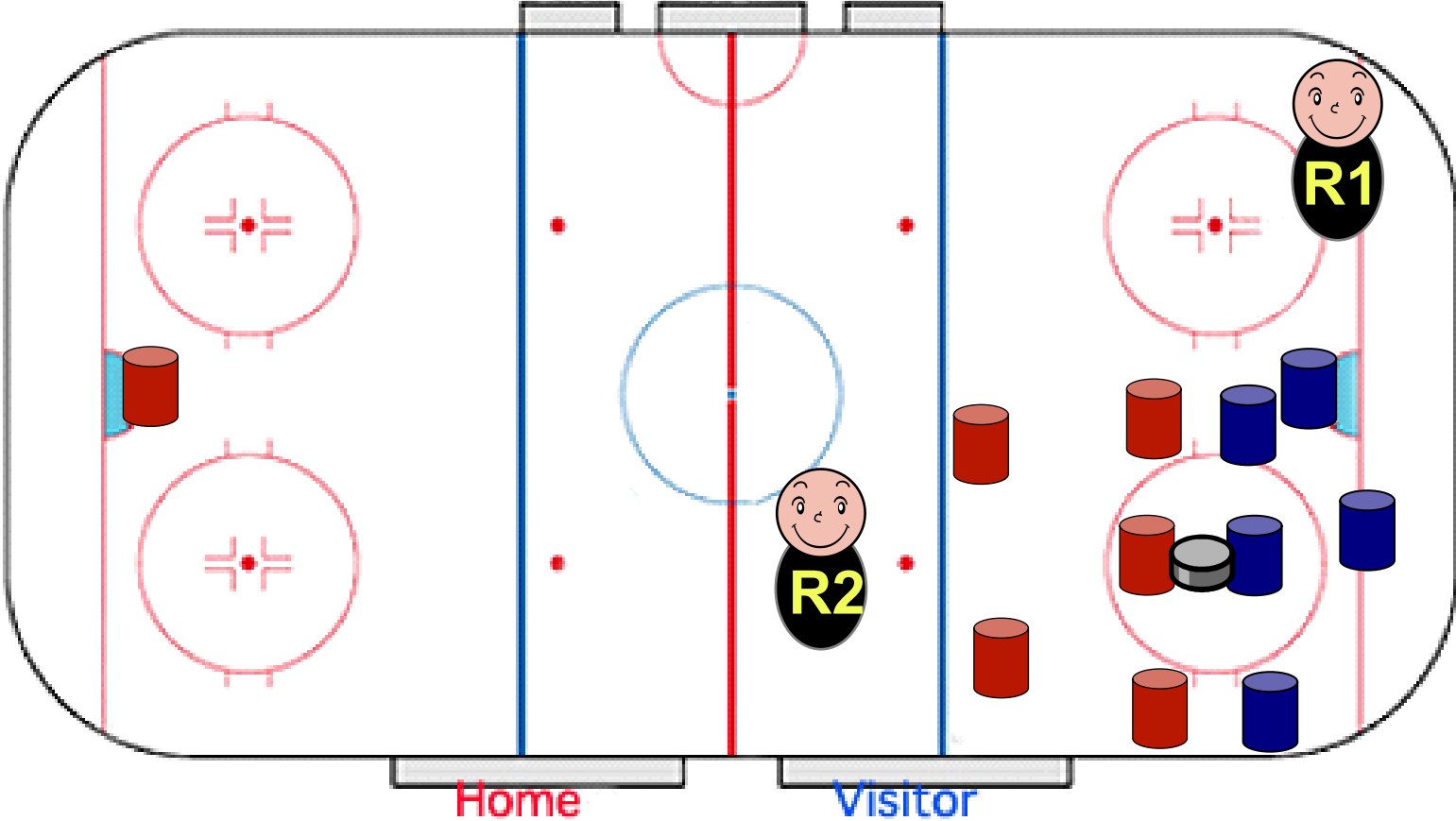

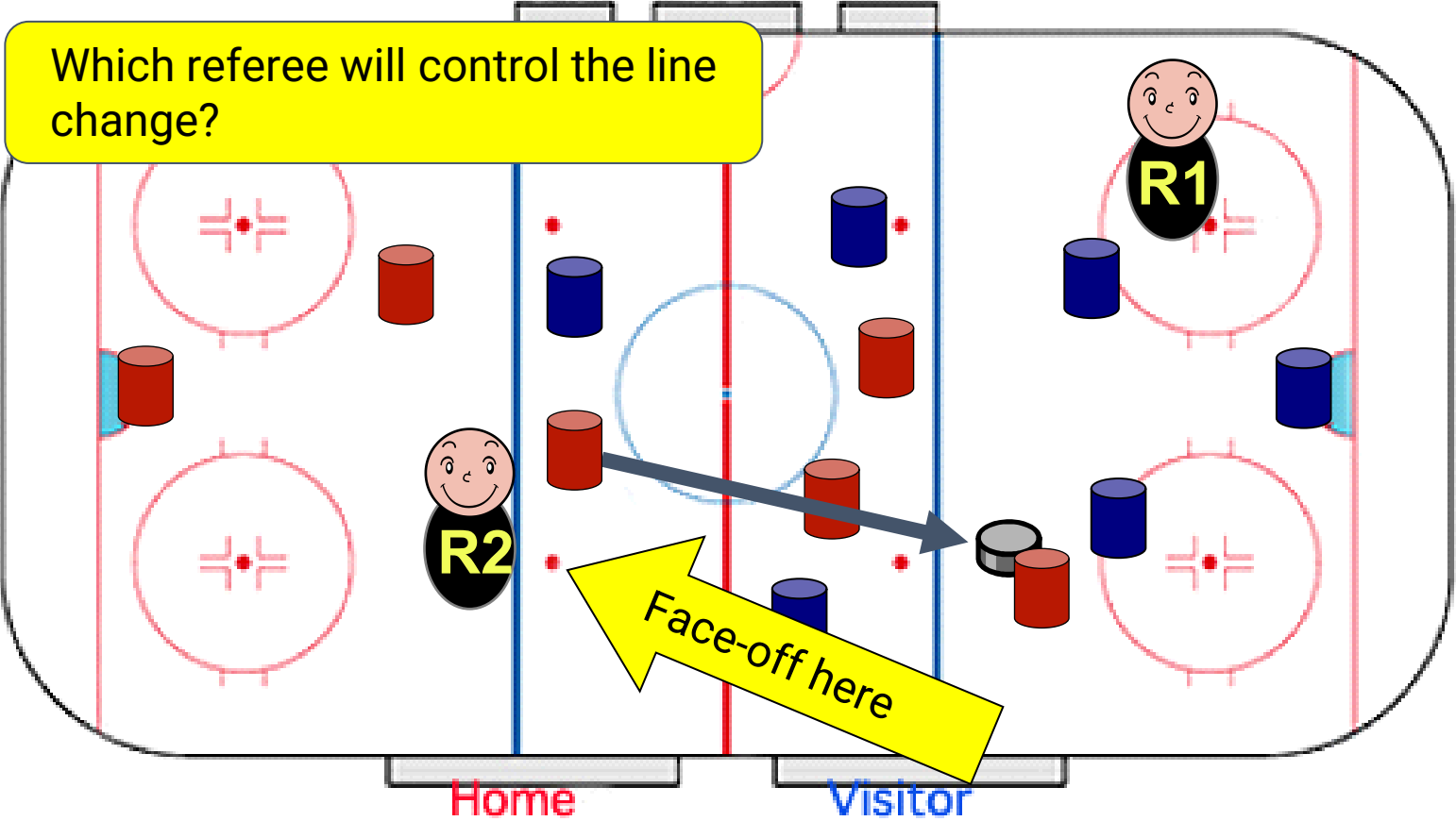
Scenario #8 – Off-Side following a “Stretch” Pass

Scenario #11 – Penalties Signaled by Both Referees

- The Referee who stops play shall initiate communication with their partner to determine whether they have the same or different penalties. This Referee will then take the lead in regards to signaling and reporting the infraction(s).



PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS



Scenario #12 – Altercation – Multiple Penalties

Immediate Actions

Lead Referee:

- Directs players to neutral area
- Directs Linespersons actions
- Monitors actions of players involved in gathering

Trailing Referee:

- Controls & monitors players distant from the gathering, including those on or at the benches



PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS



Scenario #12 – Altercation – Multiple Penalties

Post Altercation Duties

Lead Referee:

- Confers with Partner at scene of gathering
- Reports penalties and takes charge of the situation
- Deals with requests for explanations (accompanied by 1 linesperson only)

Trailing Referee:

- Controls & monitors equipment clean-up
- Provides assistance as required
- Conducts line change procedure

PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS

Scenario #13 – Penalty Shot

Referee 1:

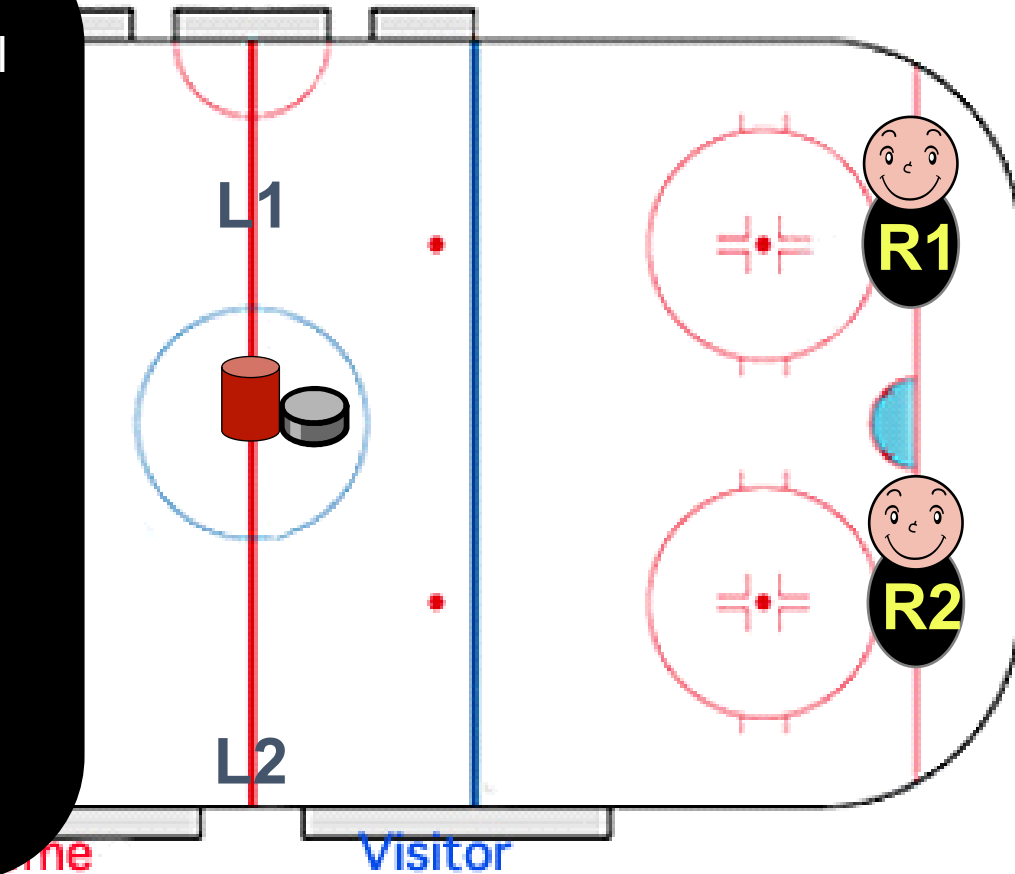
- Referee that made the call
- Has the Lead
- Stands on shooter's forehand side
- Signals and reports goal / sets up in end zone

Referee 2:

- Monitors benches
- Controls line change

Linesperson 1

- May trail behind the shooter at a distance



KEYS TO SUCCESS



- Good knowledge of and disciplined adherence to standard officiating procedures
- Good communication and error mitigation practices during unusual situations
- Check ego's at the door – Both Referee's have equal authority to call penalties - "It's about what's right; not who's right" – Work as a team!
